

International Studies Certificate (Worksheet)

- The International Studies Certificate offers the individual an opportunity to explore global studies with an emphasis on the 20th and 21st centuries. By taking a diverse set of courses with a worldview, students will broaden their perspectives and gain an appreciation and awareness of the global community.
- Individuals wishing to complete this program must successfully complete a foreign language course and at least one 3-credit course from categories I, II, and III with a minimum grade of “C” or better in each course, for a total of 15 credits.
- A maximum of three credits may be transferred into the certificate program from institutions outside of the UW Colleges.
