Criticism of UW-Fox Valley distorted facts

As the person that Mr. Ed Hodges called concerning access to people with physical disabilities to the UW-Fox Valley auditorium, I feel I need to clarify the situation described in his letter.

Mr. Hodges asked me about access, giving me the impression he wanted to know if a person with a disability could attend an event in the auditorium, not about the access issues that exist for students who take the classes that are taught in it. I pointed out that the sidewalk from the parking lot has a cut in it allowing wheelchair access, that the outside doors have automatic openers, and that the person could move directly into the auditorium as it is on the same level as the entry.

The disability access issues the campus has identified deal with the lack of access to the control booth, workshop areas, bathrooms backstage, the stage itself, and second floor support space.

Furthermore, when I asked who was calling, Mr. Hodges' reply led me to believe that he was an official from Outagamie County.

Perhaps I should not have interpreted it this way, but since Outagamie County had just taken action to provide their portion of the funding for a new auditorium, I did assume this. I told him my supervisor would return next week to talk with him, but he said, "No, you've told me everything I need."

I will not comment on Mr. Hodges' remarks about fire danger, but from glancing at the engineering study, and hearing from my supervisor that another independent assessment has brought to light even more flaws, I am sure others can respond to that issue.
